Public Safety Director Message:

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to affect the delivery of Public Safety services in 2021 but fortunately, as 2021 progressed our staff was able to re-engage with community members to a higher degree than 2020. I know that our community and our staff are pleased with more personto-person interaction in 2021.

As we reported in 2020, our community experienced its first homicide in 12 years. Through detailed and thorough investigation, our investigative staff in partnership with the investigative staff of the Anoka County

Sheriff's Office, two suspects were identified and charged with Second Degree Intentional Homicide. In 2021, one of the defendants, Nicholas Zielinski, pled guilty and was sentenced to 18 years and 8 months in prison; the second defendant, Melissa Zielinski, pled not guilty and was found guilty by the jury and was sentenced to life in prison with the possibility of parole.

The number of case numbers generated in 2021 was 12,138, which was a decrease of 1,076 case numbers in comparison to 2020. There are likely several factors that led to the decrease such as fewer calls for service, staffing shortages within the patrol function of the Police Division, and several new officers involved in the patrol-training program.

Through effective police initial response and detailed investigations our Police Division improved the overall clearance rate of crimes in our community to 56% in 2021 when compared to an overall clearance rate in 2020 of 52%. Our police staff was able to achieve a clearance rate of 92% for crimes against a person (i.e. assaults) in 2021. This is extremely impressive and a testament to our staff's commitment to keeping the residents of Lino Lakes safe.

The number of calls for fire services increased to 399 in 2021 which was an increase of 28 calls for service in comparison to 2020 (371 CFS). Through the efforts of our Fire Division, our residents only sustained property damage or loss stemming from fire in the amount of \$148,685 and the total amount of property that was saved in 2021 was \$1,251,340. Our fire personnel are committed to providing a high level of service to our community and that commitment has paid real dividends for our residents.

Public Safety professionals face many challenges and respond to tragic events which if not acknowledged and addressed can have profound and lasting effects on public safety personnel. In 2021, we added comprehensive mental health care for all public safety staff through a contract with LE-AST. The addition of the LE-AST services to our employee wellness program was a needed addition and one that our staff has found beneficial. Communities demand a lot of their public safety professionals and it is imperative that we provide training and resources for them to remain healthy, both physically and mentally. In 2021, our community demonstrated their support for our public safety professionals throughout the year but in particular with the investment in first responder wellness.

It is an honor to work with the dedicated professionals of the Lino Lakes Public Safety Department providing services to a great and supportive community. Thank you!

Police Division

Throughout 2021, the LLPSD Police Division was able to reintegrate some of the in-person community outreach initiatives and community events that had been put on hold since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. Police staff also returned to the more traditional way of handling police calls face-to-face, compared to the way they handled calls during the heightened precautionary time of 2020 when they were encouraged to handle calls by phone,



when possible. In 2021, officers continued to respond to calls for service with great caution, respecting distance and wearing PPE as necessary, but with lifted restrictions, officers were grateful for the chance to get back to the way they enjoy doing their jobs most, in-person.

Although many trainings and meetings continued to be conducted remotely in 2021, some in-person trainings became a reality again for police staff, both in-house and external. Police staff know the value of partnerships with other law enforcement partners and other community assistance resource groups, but without the ability to network and make

connections in 2020, there was ground to make up. Many county-wide planning and collaboration groups were back to in-person meetings once again.

Also in 2021, the Police Division began the Pay it Forward initiative. The program was designed to afford officers opportunities to make positive impacts on people they interact with; to brighten a stranger's day, or give someone a little financial help when they need it most. The program started in June, 2021. From June through December, participating officers from the department gave away twenty gift cards to people in a variety of situations, for a total amount gifted of \$320.

In 2021, three new police officers were hired to backfill vacancies. The challenge of successfully training three officers was well received by the talented trainers and the new officers have adjusted well to their new roles as Lino Lakes Police Officers.

Throughout 2021, the LLPSD Police Division continued as the primary first responder on all medical calls for service and fire staff responded with police to all major medical emergencies in the community. Throughout the year, the Police Division responded to 819 medical calls and achieved an average emergency response time of 4 minutes 54 seconds to those calls.

The department's canine, Argos, continued his service with his handler, Officer Kristen Mobraten. Although COVID-19 continued to hinder the team's ability to showcase their abilities through public demonstrations, they were able to participate in seven public demonstrations.

Throughout 2021, Argos was deployed 18 times to assist Officers of the Lino Lakes Police Department and other surrounding agencies on a variety of calls including suspect tracks, article searches, and



drug sniffs. On November 1st, Argos was deployed on three separate calls to assist both neighboring agencies and the Lino Lakes Police Department. One of the calls was a request to search a business that had been burglarized. Upon arrival, Argos was deployed into the building where he worked to search for anyone still inside. Although the suspects had fled prior to our arrival, his presence alone made what could potentially have been a dangerous encounter safer and more controlled.

In another notable incident, Argos was requested by Lino Lakes Police Sergeant Boehme to sniff a vehicle that had been impounded and held for forfeiture following the arrest of the driver. Information had been received by an anonymous informant there was a sizeable amount of cocaine hidden inside the vehicle. Argos was deployed to sniff the vehicle and he gave a positive alert to the rear driver's side door. A subsequent search of the vehicle produced 13.9 grams of suspected cocaine under a rear passenger seat.

On January 17th, Argos attended the Region 12 Detector Dog Certification where he certified and finished with another near perfect score. On June 15th, Argos participated in the Region 12 Patrol Dog 1 Certification where he performed in agility, suspect search, article search, obedience, apprehension, and apprehension with gunfire events, receiving his certification.

Officer Mobraten and K9 Argos put in a total of 198.5 hours of training in 2021 in an effort to remain a reliable team not only for the Lino Lakes Community, but to all who request their assistance.

Investigations

The investigations unit, within the Police Division, is responsible for in-depth criminal investigations. Until 2021, the Investigations Unit consisted of a Sergeant, who led the team, and three sworn police officers. In 2021 we were pleased to welcome a new position in the unit, an Investigative Assistant. The Investigative Assistant is a civilian employee who supports the team by assisting with case files and investigations, data requests, forfeiture processes, processing evidence, conducting background investigations, and many other duties.

Together, the team investigated 230 criminal cases. Of those 230 cases, 95 of them were submitted to the prosecuting authority for charging considerations, or misdemeanor citations issued. Additionally, the investigations unit worked 97 cases that were referred from child and adult protection organizations, such as the Minnesota Adult Abuse Reporting Center (MAARC). Beyond investigating criminal matters, the investigations unit conducted 116 background investigations for city permits or employment processes.

Throughout the year, the investigations unit worked several significant investigations to include motor vehicles thefts, burglaries, significant retail crimes, lottery thefts, and crimes against persons. The unit used creative investigative techniques, undercover operations, collaboration with other law enforcement agencies, and community partners to successfully solve these crimes and help contribute to justice for the victims.

In addition to their criminal investigation contributions, members of our investigations team also contributed to our internal training programs, forfeiture cases, pro-active investigation assistance to the patrol unit, and engaged in community relationship building events.

Fire Division

The Fire Division responded to 399 calls for service in 2021 compared to 371 in 2020. The majority of the calls in 2021 were motor vehicle crashes at 82. This is an increase from 2020, which saw 40 calls for motor vehicle crashes (NFPA 322).

The Fire Division responded to 35 calls for service involving fire (NFPA 100). These calls resulted in \$148.685.00 in property damage/loss. Through fire suppression efforts, there was \$1,251,340.00 worth of property saved in 2021.

The breakdown of calls for service by station. The Police/ Firefighters responded to 78 calls for service, this was a decrease from 176 calls for service handled by our Police/Firefighters in 2020. Fire Station 1, 7741 Lake Dr. had 152 calls for service. Fire Station 2, 1710 Birch Street had 121 calls for service, and our Duty Officer responded to 48 calls for service. This was an increase from the 21 calls for service our Duty Officer responded to in 2020. The Duty Officer calls are usually non-emergent calls.

Administrative Division and Emergency Management

The Public Safety Department continued to provide the highest quality training for our public safety personnel a priority in 2021. Our team stays up to date on industry best standards, current case law, and all state and federal mandated training requirements. We continued our partnership with Century College through a multi-jurisdictional continuing education program, as well as utilizing online training resources, local public safety training programs, and national consultants. Our teams continued to train on mental health awareness, deescalation techniques, autism awareness, implicit bias, and conflict resolution so that we may continue to serve our communities with the highest regard.

Our Fire Division received training twice a month through the public safety training firm, Fire Inc. Our teams trained on a variety topics that included fire suppression techniques, search and rescue, fire scene safety and security, emergency vehicle operations, CPR, emergency medical care, and vehicle extrication techniques. Beyond the partnership with Fire Inc., each station held additional training once per month on station specific topics and team building exercises.

Collaboratively, our public safety teams used online training programs to receive continuing education training on hazardous materials, employee right to know training, OSHA requirements, and legal training updates on the department's policy and procedural manual. The Emergency Management Team continued to work closely with local partners, like Anoka County Public Health, as we continued our response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Emergency Management Staff continued to secure PPE and updated virus mitigation strategies throughout 2021.

Our Public Safety Records Unit continued to provide a high level of customer service and efficiency in 2021. The Public Safety Records Unit staffs the front service window at our Public Safety Department and provides phone support for citizens Monday – Friday. In addition to helping connect citizens to public safety services, our records unit achieved the following:

- Processed all police reports and supplemental reports for 12,138 cases.
- Filed 1.021 citations.
- Processed 259 permits to purchase firearms.
- Processed 134 City dog licenses.
- Completed over 210 local records checks.
- Processed over 524 criminal history queries.
- Processed over 20 burn permit applications.

Volunteer Section

RESERVES – In 2021, the Lino Lakes Public Safety Department Reserve Unit was comprised of 7 volunteer reserve officers. These reserve officers supported the functions of the Public Safety Department in multiple The police reserves participated in community events, provided traffic and pedestrian safety, provided uniformed patrol in marked patrol cars, and conducted home and business checks. They also assisted full time

officers with community education, training events, prisoner transports and select calls for service. Their involvement and participation with the department are all in an effort to help fulfill the mission of the department by providing a healthy and safe community, focusing on prevention, promoting life safety, aggressively pursuing criminals, encouraging volunteerism and continuing to enhance and strengthen the agency's community oriented policing philosophy.

In 2021, the Public Safety Department Reserve Officers were trained by LLPD staff and the reserve unit command staff in vehicle operations, use of force, officer safety, Taser, first aid, traffic direction, search and rescue, patrol tactics, public relations, legal issues, radio operations, occupational hazards, cultural diversity, report writing and officer assists.

Reserve officers handled 22 transports, assisted officers on 84 calls and handled 46 ordinance/public assist calls for service and provided over 302 hours of neighborhood patrol. This assistance enabled sworn officers to remain in Lino Lakes, available to patrol the city and to respond to calls for service. Throughout 2021, the Public Safety Department Reserve Officers donated over 1034 hours of service to our community.

CHAPLAIN PROGRAM - The Lino Lakes Chaplain Program began in 2003 when it was realized that officers needed additional assistance during critical incidents. Since that time, the chaplain program has played an important part in serving not only the citizens of Lino Lakes, but also police officers and firefighters. The chaplain program originally only served police activities, but after Lino Lakes began its own fire service, the program was expanded to assist on fire related incidents as well. The main types of calls a police officer will request a chaplain to assist them with are scenes where a death has occurred and when a death notification needs to be delivered. The main reason an officer will request a chaplain for these situations is so that there is someone who can provide support to the family while the officer

completes the investigation. When it comes to fire related calls the most common call a chaplain will respond to is a structure fire. Again, the chaplains are called upon to provide support and resources to families who suffer losses due to a fire. The calls that a chaplain responds to are very sensitive and their ability to provide counseling and crisis management is an invaluable service to the officers and firefighters. Chaplains are on call 24-hours a day, every day throughout the year.

Beyond assisting public safety staff with the aforementioned situations, chaplains also keep in contact with our police officers and firefighters to see how they are handling the day-today stresses that are a part of public safety. Some of the ways a chaplain will connect with staff are by going on a ride-a-long with an officer or by dropping by the police department or fire department to visit.

Our current chaplain, Wes Pederson, is from Eagle Brook Church and joined our program in 2016. Chaplain Pederson completed his MESCA (basic chaplain training) in 2017.

CERT - The Lino Lakes Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) was founded in April 2008 with twenty-five citizens who were trained to help their community in times of need. There have been three additional training classes offered since 2008 and the program currently has around forty members. The idea of a community emergency response team was initially developed and implemented by the Los Angeles Fire Department in 1985 in order to have trained citizens respond during disaster situations.



In order to become a CERT member a person must successfully complete a training program that covers topics such as disaster preparedness, fire safety, disaster medical operations, light search and rescue, CERT organization, disaster psychology, and terrorism & CERT. During the last week of training, the members participate in a final scenario where they use their newly learned skills to rescue role-players during a simulated disaster situation.

CERT members have been activated in order to assist police and fire personnel to search for evidence and missing persons as well as participating in community events such as Breakfast with Santa, Blue Heron Days and the fun run at Lino Lakes STEM School.

CERT members are offered training opportunities as they become available and most members have been trained to be severe storm spotters through Metro SKYWARN.

EXPLORERS - The Explorer program is sponsored by local law enforcement agencies to provide career information to students between the ages of 14 and 20. It also provides structure and resources needed for teens and young adults to make good choices and to achieve their full potential as individuals.

Students learn first-hand the duties and responsibilities of police officers, by bringing interested youth and police officers together on a weekly basis. In 2021, the exploring program



was able to return to hosting regular weekly meetings. At those meetings, the explorers learn about a variety of law enforcement topics. Some of those topics are traffic stops, crime scene search, domestic crisis calls, burglary response, first aid and how to conduct interviews and interrogations.



Due to continued COVID restrictions, both of the annual exploring conferences were cancelled. These events allow the explorers to meet their peers and compete against other explorers from throughout the state. The explorers are also exposed to law enforcement agencies at the state and federal level, and they have a chance to receive college scholarship money through their participation in the mock scenarios.

Volunteering in the community is also an important aspect of the Explorer program. This year explorers

participated in over 400 hours of various community activities. The explorers assisted with the Blue Heron Days parade, the 3M Golf Championship in Blaine and the Anoka Halloween parade in addition to their weekly meetings and ride-alongs with officers.

TRAIL WATCH – Trail Watch is a group of 23 volunteers that report incidents observed in our city parks and on our trails to members of the Lino Lakes Public Safety Department. Volunteers share information about current issues that need monitoring, and keep an eye on the areas of the city that they frequently visit. Trail Watch volunteers report potential safety hazards, ordinance violations, suspicious activity, and conduct extra patrols in areas that are in need of additional attention.

During 2021, the Trail Watch team completed 521 hours of patrol. During their patrols, observations were made that resulted in 5 safety/maintenance requests, 4 reports pertaining to animal issues, 4 reports of vandalism, 3 reports of after-hours activity in parks, a check welfare request, an ATV violation, and the discovery of an abandoned vehicle. The Trail Watch volunteers provide a great service to our city by assisting our staff in making sure all the parks and trails are safe for our community to use.

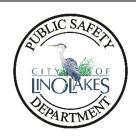

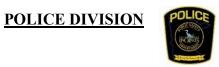
