#### **Public Safety Director Message:**

The level of service demands on public safety personnel continued to increase during 2017 and our staff continues to perform at the highest level.

The number of medical calls for service continues to increase and this trend is likely to continue in future years as our community grows and our population gets older. The total number of medical calls for service in 2017 was 803. This is an increase of 183 over the 2016 total (620) and an increase of 304 over the 2015 total (499). During 2018, we will do further analysis of this trend and explore options to potentially slow the rate of increases without affecting service levels.

Our police staff continued in the role of primary first responders for all medical calls for service and as such responded to all 803 medical calls for service. Our paid on-call fire staff responded to 18 medical calls for service in 2017. It is the medical response protocols developed in collaboration with North Memorial Ambulance Service that has enabled our department to reduce the number of paid on-call firefighter's response to medicals, while continuing to provide a high level of service.

Our public safety staff responded to 316 fire/rescue calls for service in 2017. Utilizing a public safety response model, our cross-trained police/firefighters responded to all 316 calls for service with paid on-call firefighters supplementing this response on 190 calls for service. Our public safety response model, has reduced response time, ensured there were a safe and effective number of fire responders during the work week, and provided proper life balance for paid on-call firefighters.

The Insurance Services Office (ISO) conducted an audit of our fire operations in fall of 2017. This is the first ISO rating since moving to our current public safety response model. I am proud to announce that our ISO Public Protection Classification (PPC) rating improved from 5/5Y to 4/4X. This new ISO PPC rating is a testament to the hard work of our staff over the last two years.

Significant investments were made during 2017 in the fire apparatus serving our community. An aerial device was added, both Engine 11 and Engine 21 were replaced with 2017 models, and both Tanker 11 and Tanker 21 were refurbished and enhanced in order to prolong their use to our community. These investments will serve our community well and ensure that we are well positioned for fire response for years to come.

Our police staff achieved a clearance rate of 82% for all criminal cases that occurred in our community. This is a direct result of an effective initial response by patrol staff and thorough secondary investigations conducted by our investigative and patrol staff. This integrated team approach continues to provide great outcomes for our community.

Our staff responded to a total of 17 calls involving individuals that overdosed on substances. Of these 17 calls, 10 involved individuals intentionally overdosing and 7 incidents involved non-intentional overdoses. Tragically, three of these non-intentional overdose incidents resulted in the death of those individuals. These incidents are currently under investigation with the goal of identifying the party or

parties who sold the illegal narcotic to the victim in order to hold them accountable and prevent other overdose incidents. This is a prolific problem throughout our country and one that we and our community must work together to stop. One immediate way our community can assist us in this matter is to properly dispose of all unused prescription medications. If you have unused prescription medications please dispose of them at the Public Safety Department prescription drop box located in our lobby.



Our staff continues to be highly engaged with our community and we conducted numerous community meetings, personal safety workshops, and

child car seat clinics just to name a few. During the fall the re-designed Public Safety Citizen's Academy was launched with a limited number of participants in the class to maximize opportunities to get handson experience. This re-designed approach received high praise from the 12 participants and our new and improved Public Safety Citizen's Academy will be offered again in the spring of 2018.

The Public Safety volunteer groups continue to donate their time and skills to serve our community patrolling, posting neighborhood alerts, assisting with community festivals, performing clerical work, and transporting arrested parties to jail. The dedication of our volunteers further enhances the quality services we are able to provide to our community.

On behalf of the members of the Public Safety Department, I would like to thank you for the opportunity to serve this great community!

#### **Police Division**

The total number of Part 1 Crimes went down for the second year, with 9 crimes against people and 167 property crimes for a total of 176 Part 1 Crimes. This is a reduction of 48 crimes in comparison to 2016 and a reduction of 83 crimes in comparison to 2015.

The total number of Part 2 Crimes in 2017 did increase, which continues an on-going trend from previous years. The total number of Part 2 Crimes for 2017 was 808 crimes. This is an increase of 225 crimes in comparison to 2016 totals and an increase of 282 crimes in comparison to 2015. The crime categories that increased the most in 2017 were Assaults and Narcotics related violations.

During 2017 there were 83 assaults that took place in comparison to 2016 with 47 assaults taking place. The majority of this increase is a result of domestic assaults involving non-intimate partners (i.e. assaults involving family members that are not currently or formerly romantically involved). Staff will be working with community partners and our prosecuting attorneys to develop strategies to reduce the number of assaults.

There were 191 Narcotic related crimes that occurred in 2017 in comparison to 128 crimes that occurred in 2016. This higher rate of occurrences is a direct result of our focus on these types of crimes; this focus resulted in 189 arrests for Narcotic related crimes.

Staff conducted extensive research and field testing of body worn camera (BWC) systems in 2017. These efforts were utilized to develop department policy regarding BWCs, which was posted on the department website to enable community members to provide comment on the policy and use of BWC systems by police. Based on the information developed by staff, the Panasonic Arbitrator system was selected. All in-squad camera systems will be upgraded and the deployment of BWC systems will take place in the first quarter of 2018.

In 2017 the Investigations Unit investigated 144 cases, which resulted in 99 of these cases being submitted for felony charges and 25 resulted in misdemeanor charges, or the referral of the case to a prosecutor in another jurisdiction. These investigations and case dispositions produced a total clearance rate of over 82%. As part of the evidence collection of the investigations, 35 search warrants were applied for, granted, and executed. Along with the criminal investigations, 116 background checks were completed related to alcohol or tobacco license applications, solicitor permits, or preemployment investigations. Forty-five discovery requests for video, photos, or other evidence were processed. The investigators, who are all police/firefighters, utilized their firefighter skills to provide fire daytime response 49 times.

A few of the most significant investigations conducted in 2017 include:

- An investigation resulted in a search warrant being executed at a residence where it was believed a subject possessed child pornography. The search warrant led to an arrest, subsequent confession, forensic analysis of several electronic devices, and a guilty plea.
- A report of mistreatment of an elderly victim at an assisted living facility was investigated, and led to two caregivers being charged for their crimes. The investigation and charges attracted attention from media outlets, and state and county licensing agencies were involved in the resolution of the case to ensure that all precautionary steps were taken to ensure the safest environment for other residents of the facility.
- A resident of another city discovered their credit card was used at a Lino Lakes gas station. Surveillance video was collected, and the suspect was identified. A search warrant was executed on the suspect's residence, and evidence of a much larger identity theft operation was discovered. The suspect was charged in multiple counties for various financial crimes.
- A stolen vehicle was located in our city and the two occupants in the vehicle were arrested. Further investigation revealed that the occupants were suspects in several burglaries in Mille Lacs County and Isanti County. A search warrant was conducted on the vehicle and evidence of the burglaries and a large amount of methamphetamine was recovered. The suspects were charged with crimes in all three counties.
- Investigators interviewed a known vehicle thief about a vehicle missing from a local car dealership. The interview resulted in a confession from the suspect, and the vehicle was recovered and returned to the owner. Minimal evidence existed at the scene of the crime, but the information collected during the interview resulted in the case being solved.

#### **Fire Division**

This marked the second year of our fire service and during 2017 significant improvements were made in the fire apparatus that serves our community. Aerial 21, a 2004 E-One Cyclone II Bronto, was added to the Fire Division fleet and is housed out of Station 2. This piece of fire apparatus is well suited to serve our community in fire suppression and rescue efforts with its 114 foot rescue/ladder platform.





Both Engine 11 and Engine 21 were replaced with 2017 Custom Fire Quick Attack Engines. These new pieces of fire apparatus replaced two 1995 Custom Fire Rescue Pumpers, which were purchased in 2015 from the City of Woodbury. These pieces of apparatus served our staff and community well during our first year of service in 2016 and during 2015 while we trained fire personnel to provide fire services.

Staff continued to focus on training and made enhancements to fire prevention programing. Staff conducted 117 fire inspections and completed 88 pre-plans to enhance emergency response. This work is crucial in our prevention efforts for our community.

Our staff responded to 29 calls for service that involved fire. These calls resulted in \$325,100 in property damage/loss. Through these fire suppression efforts, there was \$6,342,100 worth of property saved in 2017.

#### **Administrative Division and Emergency Management**

The Public Safety Department continued to leverage staff, by partnering with Century College through a multi-jurisdictional continuing education program, as well as utilizing online resources to ensure that all public safety personnel receive the highest quality training and remain up to date on all state and federal mandated training requirements.

Our in-house certified instructors provide training in areas such as firearms, use of force, CPR, emergency vehicle operations, water rescue operations, and fire scene security. During 2017, in-house fire training was conducted twice a month and staff-required continuing education was conducted once a month through Century College.

Staff continued to utilize online resources for components of the hazardous material training requirement, employee right to know training, OSHA requirements, as well as both police and fire legal updates. Staff was also provided monthly online training updates on the department's policy and procedure manual.

Staff continued to evaluate the city's emergency warning siren system (a.k.a. tornado siren). No new sirens were added in 2017. However, as the city continues to grow and develop, we will continue to assess the need of additional sirens to ensure the safety of everyone in the community.

Front office staff attended the 2017 Professional Law Enforcement Assistants Association (PLEAA) Conference. Staff attended breakout sessions and received updates in the areas of data practices, HIPAA, criminal prosecution, and civil litigation. In 2017, front office staff continued to work with the new countywide records management system. The implementation of this system continues be a significant undertaking and it is with the dedication and hard work of the records technicians that this transition is possible. It was also accomplished while performing the other tasks associated with their positions such as:

- Handling 5,512 police reports
- Filing 2,261 citations
- Processing 193 permit to purchase handgun applications
- Issuing 163 dog licenses
- Completing over 485 local records checks
- Processing over 604 criminal histories
- Processing 13 burn permits

Volunteers continue to assist the front office staff to help ensure success. Their assistance with filing, sorting, copying and miscellaneous duties is invaluable.

#### **Volunteer Section**

**RESERVES** – In 2017, the Reserve Unit was initially comprised of 11 volunteer reserve officers. The unit expanded to 17 members by the years end. These reserve officers supported the functions of the Department in multiple areas. The police reserves participated in community events, provided traffic and pedestrian safety, provided uniformed patrol in marked patrol cars, and conducted home and business checks. They also assisted full time officers with community education, training events, prisoner transports and select calls for service. Their involvement and participation with the department are all in an effort to help fulfill the mission of the department by providing a healthy and safe community, focusing on prevention, promoting life safety, aggressively pursuing criminals, encouraging volunteerism and continuing to enhance and strengthen the agency's community oriented policing philosophy.

Reserve Officers were trained by police division staff and the reserve unit command staff in vehicle operations, use of force, officer safety, Taser, first aid, traffic direction, search and rescue, patrol tactics, public relations, legal issues, radio operations, occupational hazards, cultural diversity, report writing and officer assists. Reserve officers handled 24 transports, assisted officers on 41 calls and handled 21 ordinance/public assist calls for service. This assistance enabled sworn officers to remain in Lino Lakes, available to patrol the city and to respond to calls for service.

CHAPLIN PROGRAM - The Chaplain Program was formed in 2003 by a patrol officer who realized having such a resource would be a valuable asset to our agency. Staff respond to a wide variety of incidents including situations where a death has occurred or a death notification has to be delivered. When these situations occur, chaplains are called out to assist officers with these sensitive tasks and provide an invaluable service to not only the officers, but to community members as well, by being present in order to assist with crisis management. Chaplains are on call 24-hours a day, every day throughout the year.

Beyond assisting officers, chaplains are also tasked with keeping in touch with the well-being of our officers. This is accomplished by participating in ride-alongs with the officers or by stopping at the police department for a visit.

During the majority of 2017, our chaplains were Wes Pederson and Dylan Tate who donated almost 80-hours of their time to the department. In October of 2017 Chaplain Tate resigned from the program as he had moved and felt he was no longer able to respond to calls in a reasonable period of time. During 2017, Chaplain Tate and Pederson attended and completed training through the Minnesota Emergency Service Chaplain Association (MESCA), which is said to be the premier training for police chaplains.

**CERT** - The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) had a successful year in 2017 as it completed its tenth year serving the citizens of Lino Lakes.

In addition to continuing education training, CERT members facilitated a community blood drive in August. Members also assisted the Department during community events such as the Blue Heron Days parade and the Officer Shawn Silvera Rotary Run.



When emergencies happen, CERT members give critical support to first responders, provide immediate assistance to victims, and organize volunteers at disaster sites. CERT members are trained in incident command, disaster medical operations, fire suppression, search and rescue, and disaster preparedness.

**EXPLORERS** - The Explorer Program is a program sponsored by local law enforcement agencies to provide career information to students between the ages of 14 and 20. It also provides the structure and resources needed for young adults to make ethical choices and to achieve their full potential as individuals.





Students learn first-hand the duties and responsibilities of police officers, by bringing interested youth and police officers together on a weekly basis. In April of 2017, 16 Explorers went to Rochester MN to compete at the 42<sup>nd</sup> Annual Minnesota Police Explorer Conference. Four teams competed in various events with hundreds of other Police Explorers from around the state. Explorers placed 3<sup>rd</sup> in Drill Team and 5<sup>th</sup> in Bomb Scene search, 5<sup>th</sup> in 25 yard slow shoot and 5th in the 5K run.

In October the Explorers went Duluth, MN, to compete in the 22<sup>nd</sup> Annual Duluth conference. This conference helped prepare them for the Rochester competition. This year's event was held at the Fond Du Lac Tribal and Community College in Cloquet, MN.



These conferences provide the Explorers with opportunities to meet with their peers, be exposed to law enforcement agencies at the state and federal level, and the chance to receive college scholarship money through their participation in the mock situations.

Volunteering in the community is also an important aspect of the Explorer program. The Explorers assisted in the Hugo Parade, St Paul

Bike Classic, Blue Heron Days Parade and activities, 3M Golf Championship in Blaine, Feed my Starving Children and Safety Camp.

TRAIL WATCH - Trail Watch is a group of volunteers that are responsible for recording their observations while enjoying our trails and parks. After a brief training session, members serve as "extra eyes and ears" on the trails and in the parks and are asked not to intervene in possibly dangerous situations, only to report them.

During 2017, the Trail Watch volunteers completed 513 hours of patrol. During their patrols, observations were made that resulted in 9 safety/maintenance requests, 7 reports of damage to city property, 5 reports of suspicious activity, 4 illegal dumping complaints, and 1 DWI arrest. The Trail Watch volunteers provide a great service to our city by assisting our staff in making sure all the parks and trails are safe for our community to use.

#### **Q2 Notable Actions & Events**

- Lino Lakes participated in the National Drug Take Back Initiative on Saturday, April 29<sup>th</sup>. During the event community members turned in 71.5 pounds of unused medications, which will be properly disposed.
- On May 6<sup>th</sup> staff participated in Truck Day at Rice Lake Elementary School with a patrol vehicle, Aerial 21 and Engine 21.
- On May 13th staff volunteered and constructed new playground equipment at YMCA Lino Lakes.
- On Thursday, May 18<sup>th</sup> the Public Safety Department conducted our annual Volunteer Appreciation event at Fire Station #2.
- During a Council meeting on May 22, Officer Mat Paulson received the American Legion Police
  Officer of the Year Award and Lieutenant Mark Hokkanen received the American Legion

- Aerial 21 was put into service on May 24, 2017. This piece of apparatus is a 2004 E-One Bronto Skylift with a 114' articulating platform with a 2000 gallon per minutes pump.



- On June 7<sup>th</sup> the Lino Lakes Public Safety Department hosted our annual Night to Unite Roundtable in preparation for the upcoming Night to Unite that will take place on August 1, 2017.
- On June 19<sup>th</sup> the Lino Lakes Public Safety Department hosted a "Wills for Heroes" event at Fire Station #2. This event is sponsored by the Minnesota State Bar Association in appreciation for the daily sacrifices of firefighters, police officers and other first responders. The program offers free Wills, Health Care Directives and Financial Powers of Attorney to Minnesota's first responders and their spouses.
- Engine 11 and Engine 21 were put into service on June 21, 2017. These pieces of apparatus are 2017 Custom Fire Quick Attack engines with 1250 gallons per minute pumps on 2017 Ford F650 chassis.



- Three members of the Public Safety staff have completed training and are now certified to perform child seat inspections and vehicle installations. A child seat safety clinic was held on June 28<sup>th</sup>. There will be another clinic held in the fall and individual appointments can be made by scheduling an appointment with a Community Service Officer.
- On Thursday, June 29<sup>th</sup> the Lino Lakes Public Safety Department participated in a special parade at the Centennial Middle School.
