

Public Safety Director Message:

Throughout 2019 our public safety team has continuously demonstrated their professionalism and dedication to our community and I am proud to serve alongside these public safety professionals.

In August of 2019 the Lino Lakes Public Safety Department began reporting crime data to Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension (BCA) and Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) under the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) along with all of Anoka County law enforcement, as required by law. This transition started in 2013 and made significant changes to crime data reporting which had been reported to MN BCA under the Uniform Crime Reporting.

NIBRS does provide greater detail on each crime occurrence for crimes against persons, crimes against property, and crimes against society and is divided into Group A and Group B. This new system of reporting crime data has changed how crime is reported and the tables which we have used to report crime to the public. You will see these changes in this annual report. These changes will make year to year comparisons difficult through 2020 due to changes in how crimes are classified and categorized.

The 2019 Areas of Focus for the Public Safety Department were:

- Fire Prevention Programming
- Train police staff on crisis intervention and de-escalation techniques
- Traffic Safety
- Community Communication Strategies.

Public safety staff participated in 36 public education events totaling over 400 hours of staff for fire prevention efforts in our community. One of the most notable events took place in July at 705 Town Center Parkway with the deployment of a kitchen fire demonstration. This public education event was in response to an increase in the number of fire incidents at the apartment building. This event was very well attended by community residents and the number of calls for service at the apartment building related to cooking incidents did decrease.



In 2017 the Lino Lakes Police Department implemented a plan to train all our police officers in crisis intervention. This 40 hour program trains officers on recognizing when people are in crisis, general indicators of when people are being impacted by a mental illness, strategies to help them through that crisis and de-escalation techniques. As of December 31, 2019 we have trained 16 of our team members in crisis intervention training. We have 9 remaining officers who need to be trained.

In 2018, the Lino Lakes Police Department joined a county wide collaboration and hired the consulting firm, Initial Defense, to present to our team critical training in implicit bias, conflict resolution, and crisis intervention. This 16 hour course provides our officers with training that helps identify their own bias, and strategies to overcome them. It also provides officers with training on resolving conflict, deescalation, and recognizing how to better help our community members when they are in crisis. As of December 31st, 2019 we have sent 12 officers through the training and we have 15 remaining.

In 2019 we established our traffic safety officer program after consistently hearing from our citizens that traffic safety matters were their primary concern. Officer Tou Vang was appointed to the position and served from May 2019 until December 31, 2019. Officer Vang is a certified commercial vehicle inspector and works to ensure commercial vehicles are operating in a safe manner while traveling through Lino Lakes. He often partnered with the Minnesota State Patrol to ensure safety measures are adhered to and weight restrictions are maintained. Primarily, Officer Vang spends his time listening to community feedback on where traffic safety issues are. After meeting with the resident, Officer Vang will begin to research the complaint and gather data to determine how we, as your public safety department, can help impact the problem. Officer Vang utilizes a mixed approach of education and enforcement to help solve community traffic safety concerns. Recognizing traffic safety is more than conducting traffic stops. Officer Vang attends the city traffic safety committee, where he collaborates with representatives from other city departments to ensure we take a holistic and diverse approach to traffic safety matters. Through engineering, enforcement, and education we strive to ensure everyone arrives at their destination safely. During 2019, the Traffic Safety Officer responded to 35 citizen concerns regarding traffic safety. The most common concern was speeding, followed by vehicles passing on the shoulder.

We introduced Tip411 in July of 2019 to further enhance our communication tools. The Tip411 application enables our community members to sign-up for geographically based notifications and send anonymous tips to our staff. The Tip411 is a robust platform that allows our staff to send notifications to our community directly from the Tip411 application as well as through Facebook.

On behalf of the members of the Public Safety Department, I would like to thank you for the opportunity to serve this great community!

Police Division

Throughout 2019, the police division of the LLPSD increased their efforts on traffic and pedestrian safety. The police division assigned a Traffic Safety Officer (TSO) position to focus on commercial vehicle safety, and to increase public safety through community partnerships, education efforts and traffic enforcement. The TSO took a lead role in all vehicle crash events while on-duty and analyzed all Lino Lakes crash data to identify areas of greatest concern and developed ways to positively impact those locations.

The TSO was the police officer primarily responsible for traffic complaints from Lino Lakes residents. Because of the agency's great partnerships with the Lino Lakes community, the LLPSD received numerous traffic complaints throughout the year. The TSO spent a great deal of their time addressing those concerns through the use of technology, traditional enforcement efforts and some less-thantraditional, creative approaches.

Additionally, the TSO was trained and certified in Minnesota Commercial Vehicle Inspection (CVI) and partnered with the Minnesota State Patrol CVI Division to help ensure the safe travel of commercial vehicles in, and through, Lino Lakes.

Early in 2019, the police division took on a new police canine, Argos. Argos and his handler, Officer Kristen Mobraten, were trained and certified during the second quarter of 2019, and went in-service as a team in July. Shortly after Argos took over the canine watch of Lino Lakes, the agency's former canine, Justice, retired.

In August of 2019, the police division purchased a multipassenger utility terrain vehicle (UTV) for use in remote-area rescue and enforcement efforts throughout the many miles of trails, wildlands and frozen winter lakes in the city. Officers were trained and certified by MN DNR standards, then the UTV was put in-service.



The police division also devoted a great deal of time to the following public safety, community engagement, and community education initiatives:

- Heart Safe Project, CPR training
- Collaborative partnership with assisted living and places of worship to proactively promote public safety
- Lights-on initiative
- Personal Safety education and training
- Narcotics awareness drug recognition for parents and teachers
- **Teen Driver Education**
- Firearm Safety Training
- **Snowmobile Safety Training**
- Coffee with a cop events
- DEA Drug take-back events

The LLPSD police staff continued to be the primary first responders on all medical calls for service (CFS) with fire staff responding to major medical emergencies in the community. Throughout the year, the police division responded to 847 medical calls and achieved an average emergency response time of four minutes and forty-five seconds to all medical calls.

In 2019 the Investigations Unit of the Lino Lakes Public Safety Department investigated 229 cases, with 109 of these investigations resulting in the case being submitted to the prosecuting attorney for charging. Arrests, citations, referrals to other law enforcement agencies, and similar case dispositions produced a total clearance rate of 84%. As part of the investigative process, 40 search warrants were executed. Along with the criminal investigations, 116 background checks were completed related to alcohol or tobacco license applications, solicitor permits, and pre-employment assessments. Investigations processed 225 discovery requests for video, photos, or other evidentiary material. The Investigations Unit also utilized their police/fire cross training in their response to 53 medical and fire emergencies.

A few of the significant investigations conducted in 2019 include:

- Investigators executed a search warrant, as part of an investigation, at a residence in relation to a theft of firearms report. A confession was obtained from a juvenile suspect, and charges also resulted from a guardians efforts to help the juvenile destroy evidence. A follow up search warrant was written to examine the suspect's cell phone, where additional corroborating evidence was discovered.
- An attempted solicitation of a minor report was investigated, after parents reported unusual activity on a social media account belonging to their child. A search warrant was written and the suspect was identified via information that was linked to their online accounts. With the help of a state agency, a surveillance team was created to monitor the movements of the suspect, and an operation was set up prior to the suspect's arrival.
- While conducting undercover surveillance on a home suspected of criminal activity, an investigator observed two people leave the residence in a stolen vehicle. The suspects were stopped and taken into custody, and controlled substances were located in the vehicle. The vehicle was later returned to the rightful owner.
- An investigation was initiated after a container containing cash and methamphetamine was found by an employee of a local business. A suspect was arrested at the scene, and review of their phone calls made from jail revealed additional violations of a protection order. There was also evidence discovered during the course of the investigation that children were in proximity to the controlled substances, and an adult female was later charged with child endangerment.
- After receiving numerous reports of suspected criminal activity at a residence, investigators began monitoring the address in an attempt to collect additional information. Relationships were developed with neighbors, and their willingness to forward observations to the investigators greatly advanced the investigation. During surveillance a vehicle left the residence being driven by individuals that had warrants and did not have driver's licenses. The vehicle was stopped, the occupants were arrested, controlled substances were located, and the vehicle and cash were forfeited. A search warrant was later conducted at the residence, and the parties involved in the criminal activity were eventually evicted from the property.

In addition to the cases assigned, the Investigations Unit also processed several crime scenes for DNA evidence, instructed department Use of Force and Firearms trainings, maintained their responsibilities as evidence technicians, prepared cases for court, served as DNR Youth Firearm Safety Instructors, coordinated the delivery of items to forensic laboratories for further examination, conducted follow up interviews, and processed all the administrative forfeiture cases.

Fire Division

Our community experienced an increase in our 2019 (379) fire call load in comparison to 2018 (356). The type of calls that made up the majority of these 23 calls for service (CFS) were related to vehicle crashes (NFPA 300). Our police/firefighters responded to all 379 fire CFS and our paid on-call firefighters responded to 236 fire CFS in 2019. The fire call load increased by 23 CFS for our police/firefighter and 38 CFS for our POC firefighters in comparison to 2018.

Through our public safety response model, we have developed a robust weekday fire response through our utilization of police/firefighters. In 2019, there were 177 fire CFS that occurred on weekdays between the hours of 0600 and 1800 hours. Our response model continues to be effective not only for weekday response, which have typically been problematic for suburban POC fire agencies, but also in moving lower level fire CFS to on-duty police/firefighter; rather than relying solely on POC firefighters for all fire response.



Our staff responded to 24 calls for service that involved fire. These calls resulted in \$246,600 in property damage/loss. Through these fire suppression efforts, there was \$51,940,600 worth of property saved in 2019.

Administrative Division and Emergency Management

The Public Safety Department continued to leverage staff, by partnering with Century College through a multi-jurisdictional continuing education program, as well as utilizing online resources to ensure that all public safety personnel receive the highest quality training and remain up to date on all state and federal mandated training requirements.

Please note no medical CFS are included in this table except motor vehicle accidents.

Our in-house certified instructors provide training in areas such as firearms, use of force, CPR, emergency vehicle operations, water rescue operations, and fire scene security. During 2019 in-house fire training was conducted twice a month and staff-required continuing education was conducted once a month through Century College.

Staff continued to utilize online resources for components of the hazardous material training requirement, employee right to know training, OSHA requirements, as well as both police and fire legal updates. Staff was also provided monthly online training updates on the department's policy and procedure manual.

Staff continued to evaluate the city's emergency warning siren system (a.k.a. tornado siren). No new sirens were added in 2019. However, as the city continues to grow and develop, we will continue to assess the need for additional sirens to ensure the safety of everyone in the community.

Front office staff attended the 2019 BCA Users conference where they received updates in Terminal Administration, National Incident Based Reporting, Criminal histories, firearms permits, and data practices. Our records unit continued to work at the successful implementation of our new records management system and criminal history systems. This was accomplished while performing the other tasks associated with their positions such as:

- Handled 6,366 police reports
- Filed 1,674 citations
- Processed 184 permit to purchase handgun applications
- Issued 180 dog licenses
- Completed over 179 local records checks
- Processed over 804 criminal histories
- Processed 16 burn permits

Volunteer Section

RESERVES - In 2019, the Lino Lakes Public Safety Department Reserve Unit was comprised of 12 volunteer reserve officers. These reserve officers supported the functions of the Public Safety Department in multiple areas. The police reserves participated in community events, provided traffic and pedestrian safety, provided uniformed patrol in marked patrol cars, and conducted home and business checks. They also assisted full time officers with community education, training events, prisoner transports and select calls for service. Their involvement and participation with the



department are all in an effort to help fulfill the mission of the department by providing a healthy and safe community, focusing on prevention, promoting life safety, aggressively pursuing criminals, encouraging volunteerism and continuing to enhance and strengthen the agency's community oriented policing philosophy.

In 2019, the Public Safety Department Reserve Officers were trained by LLPD staff and the reserve unit command staff in vehicle operations, use of force, officer safety, Taser, first aid, traffic direction,

search and rescue, patrol tactics, public relations, legal issues, radio operations, occupational hazards, cultural diversity, report writing and officer assists.

Reserve officers handled 30 transports, assisted officers on 122 calls and handled 42 ordinance/public assist calls for service and provided over 400 hours of neighborhood patrol. This assistance enabled sworn officers to remain in Lino Lakes, available to patrol the city and to respond to calls for service. Throughout 2019, the Public Safety Department Reserve Officers donated over 2563 hours of service to our community.

CHAPLIN PROGRAM - The Lino Lakes Chaplain Program is an important asset to our agency as it not only serves the citizens of Lino Lakes, but police and fire staff as well. The chaplain program was formed in 2003 by a patrol officer who recognized the importance of having such a resource available to the officers. The program originally only served police activities but has since grown and now assists in fire related incidents as well. The types of incidents a chaplain may respond to include situations where a death has occurred, a death notification has to be delivered to a family or scenes where a residence was damaged or lost to a fire. When these sensitive situations occur, chaplains are called to assist and they provide an invaluable service by helping with crisis management. Chaplains are on call 24-hours a day, every day throughout the year.

Beyond assisting public safety staff with the aforementioned situations, chaplains also keep in contact with our police officers and firefighters to see how they are handling the day to day stresses are a part of public safety. Chaplains are able to connect with staff by participating in a ride-along with police officers or by stopping by the police/fire department to check in and visit.

Our current chaplain Wes Pederson is from Eagle Brook Church and joined our program in 2016. Chaplain Pederson completed his MESCA (basic chaplain training) in 2017.

CERT - The Lino Lakes Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) began in April of 2008 with twenty-five citizens attending the initial class. Since then three more basic classes have been held and we now have around forty active members in the program. CERT was formed in order to train citizens to respond during disaster situations.



In order to become a CERT member a person must complete a training program that covers topics such as: disaster preparedness, fire safety, disaster medical operations, light search and rescue, CERT organization, disaster psychology, and terrorism & CERT. During the last week of training the members participate in a final scenario where they use all the skills they have learned to rescue role-players during a simulated disaster situation.

Over the years CERT members have been activated to help search for evidence after an aircraft crash, search for missing people as well as to help with community events such as Blue Heron Days and the fun run at Lino Lakes STEM School.

CERT members are offered training opportunities as they become available and most members have been trained to be severe storm spotters through Metro SKYWARN.



EXPLORERS - The Explorer Program is a program sponsored by local law enforcement agencies to provide career information to students between the ages of 14 and 20. It also provides the structure and resources needed for young adults to make ethical choices and to achieve their full potential as individuals.

In October of 2019 the Explorers went Duluth, MN, to compete in the Annual Duluth conference at the Fond Du Lac Tribal and Community College. This conference helped prepare them for the Rochester competition. Here they received a 1st place award for field first aid.

Students learn first-hand the duties and responsibilities of police officers, by bringing interested youth and police officers together on a weekly basis. In April of 2019, 8 Explorers went to Rochester MN to compete at the annual Law Enforcement Explorer Conference. Two teams competed in various events including pistol shooting, a bicycle obstacle course, a sample police exam and multiple law enforcement related scenarios such as handling burglary calls, first aid, crime prevention and traffic stops. They placed 2nd in the interview and interrogation event.

These conferences provide the Explorers with opportunities to meet other explorers who share their interests in law enforcement, be exposed to law enforcement agencies at the state and federal level, and the chance to receive college scholarship money through their participation in the mock scenarios.

Volunteering in the community is also an important aspect of the Explorer program. The Explorers assisted in the Ramsey and Anoka County Polar Plunge events, Blue Line Ball, Guns N Hoses, Blue Heron Days Parade and activities and the 3M Golf Championship in Blaine.



TRAIL WATCH – Trail Watch is a group of approximately 25 volunteers that report incidents observed in our city parks and on our trails to a liaison with the Public Safety Department. Volunteers share information about current issues that need monitoring, and keep an eye on the areas of the city that they frequently visit. Trail Watch volunteers report suspicious activity and potential safety hazards.

During 2019, Trail Watch volunteers completed 473 hours of patrol. During their patrols, observations were made that resulted in 6 safety/maintenance requests, 5 reports pertaining to animal issues, 4 reports of damage to city property, 4 reports of after-hours activity in parks, a littering complaint, and an abandoned vehicle complaint. The Trail Watch volunteers provide a great service to our city by assisting our staff in making sure all the parks and trails are safe for our community to use.

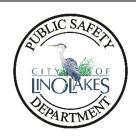

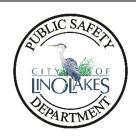
